THE DEGREE: BACHELOR OF RURAL STUDIES - B.R.S.

(THREE YEARS Course disbursed in SIX SEMESTERS Degree Course)

The objective of the Course is “To provide higher education in rural areas and to develop rural society and the nation”.

O.B.R.S. – 1:

A candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Rural Studies must have passed the Higher Secondary (12th Standard) School Certificate Examination of the Gujarat Secondary Education Board with any stream and having 40 percentage of marks. Candidate of SC/ST get relaxation of 5 % Marks.

O.B.R.S. – 2:

Admission to first semester B.R.S. will be granted to an applicant who is eligible to apply for admission to first semester B.R.S. strictly in order of merit determined on the basis of marks or rules laid by central admission committee of the University.

O.B.R.S. – 3:

An affiliated college or institution conducting B.R.S., course will not be allowed to admit more than 80 students to First semester B.R.S. Course as per the State Government norms.

O.B.R.S. – 4:

Medium of instruction & examination shall be Gujarati

R.B.R.S. – 1

The duration of this course will be of three years divided into six semesters. This will be full time course and candidate admitted to this course will not be allowed to join any other course simultaneously.

R.B.R.S. – 2

The candidate admitted to First semester B.R.S. will be eligible to appear at the university examination provided he / she fulfills the following conditions.

She/he fulfills conditions of minimum attendance as laid down in Ordinance of the Bhavnagar University.

R.B.R.S. – 3

The Scheme of examination and distribution of marks for the various subjects of study at the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth and Six Semester B.R.S. Examinations under three years course will be as shown in the course structure.

R.B.R.S. – 4

Candidates desirous of appearing at the University Semester B.R.S. Examination must forward their applications in the prescribed form accompanied by a certificate of attendance to the Registrar, through the Principal of the College on or before the date prescribed for the purpose under the relevant Ordinance. (s).

R.B.R.S. - 5

The CBCS is not only student centric in the teaching-learning processes but is also their evaluation process. In CBCS, the evaluation process is divided into two parts under the CBCS. The first part-consists of Internal Evaluation (IE) and the second part consists of the Semester End Examination. The division of marks between the two shall be as per the University roles. In the CBCS, the evaluation process shall follow the norm that the faculty, who teaches the course, shall conduct the Internal Evaluation (IE) and the Semester end examination (SEE). The concerned faculty shall be accountable for transparency and reliability of the entire evaluation of the student in the concerned Course.

5.1 The framework for Internal Evaluation (IE)

Although assessment and evaluation process in CBCS is in continuous mode, for the purpose of finally letting the candidate know his/her progress periodically, an assessment is divided into four discrete components for reporting the scores to the student as earned by him or her.

The details of the Continuous Assessment are summarized in the Table below:

5.1.1 The CAC (College Advisory Council) shall announce policy for IE for all the courses in the colleges in the beginning of the Semester and the same shall be communicated to the students.

5.1.2 The Internal Evaluation and scores of first part of the semester shall be completed during the 5th week of the semester.

5.1.3 The Internal Evaluation and scores of the second part of the semester shall be completed during the 10th week of the semester.

5.1.4 The Internal Evaluation and scores of third part of the semester will be completed during the 15th week of the semester.

5.1.5 In case a student fails to secure 12 out of 30 in the Internal Evaluation (all three components taken together), he/she shall not be allowed to appear for the Semester end examination. If candidate is not appearing in internal examination, he / she will be allowed for one chance to appear for missing test under the following conditions:

(i) If a student produces the illness certificate of a medical officer of a Government hospital or a campus doctor or a registered medical practitioner.

(ii) On account of death of a person who is in blood relation with the candidate.

5.2 Semester End Examination (SEE)

During the 18th to 20th week of the Semester, a semester-end examination shall be conducted.

5.2.1 The duration of the semester-end examination shall be two hours for courses with practical and two and half hours for courses without practical. A question paper for semester end examination shall not expect the student to reproduce the answers by memorizing the topics, but it shall rather examine the candidate's creativity, comprehension, problem solving ability, interpretation and awareness capabilities.

5.2.2 The total weight for a practical will be of 20 percent, in all the courses containing practical. The practical Examination will be conducted by the University.

5.3 Final awarding of the Grades shall be completed latest by 24th week of the semester.

The head of the College shall forward to the controller of Examination the consolidated marks of all the students in IE and SEE for final computation of the Grade and announcement of the result.

Notes:

- 1. The result of the evaluated component shall be communicated to the students within 7 days of the completion each component.**
- 2. The final grades shall be announced latest by 24th week**

Practical examination

Practical examination (wherever applicable) shall be conducted at the end of every semester. The examination shall be conducted as per norms decided by the concerned authority of the university. Controller of Examination shall announce policy for the practical examination in advanced and it shall be made known to the students also in advance. 20 Marks Practical examination conducted by one Internal and one external evaluator. There shall be no internal assessment test for practical/laboratory work.

R.B.R.S. – 6 PRODUCTIVE LABOR WORKS, KHEDUT SHIBIR/ GRAM SHIBIR AND KENDRA NIVAS TOUR AND OTHER OFF CAMPUS PROGRAMME.

6.1 PRODUCTIVE LABOR WORKS

There shall be a prior condition to appear in the final examination of one to five semesters that each student has completed the manual Productive labor work of required hours i.e.120 hours for each semester.

For male student total hours of manual Productive labor work required for each semester will be of 120 hours, except for sixth semester and for female & Handicap students, the total hours of manual Productive labor work required for each semester will be of 110 hours, except for sixth semester. No Productive labor work shall be assigned during last semester.

Fifty hours will gain to each students through Farmers family work sibir. So total 650 hours to be completed to get B.R.S. degree for male & 600 hours for female & Handicap students.

If student can not complete satisfactory manual Productive labor work of 120 hours (110 hrs for female & Handicap students) at the end of each semester, He/She have to complete satisfactory manual Productive labor work by his/her own effort and risk at the vacation time. He/She can admit in next semester but the result of current semester withheld until completion of satisfactory manual Productive labor work.

6.2 YOGA / BALWADI SIBIR

In first Semester 7 days Dhyan-Yoga sibir OR Balwadi sibir to be completed by students. It is compulsory for all students. Evaluation will be done as follows.

If student can not appear in the sedualed sibir, He/She have to complete sibir by his/her own effort and risk at the vacation time. He/She can admit in semester-2 but the result of semester-1 withheld until completion of sibir.

6.3 DEPRIVED AREA STUDY CAMP

In second semester, 8 to 10 days deprived area arranged by college. Student must have join the camp. Objective of this camp are as under.

The syllabus of Gramvidhya Vidhyashakha is based on sarvodayi Social structure. College are arranged deprived area study camp to introduce students with life style, problems & Characteristics of deprived area people & try to live with then with harmany.

During the camp lectures of expert & Sevak on different side of life style of deprived people. Students done different activities like Balgito, Stories, Dance with deprived area children ,& survey. To inform deprived farmers with latest knowledge of agriculture & animal husbandry. Students also take part in village cleanliness, School management, cultural programme etc. Students collect songs, language, dialect, study lifestyle of deprived people, & prepare final report at the end of the camp & submit it to the college.

If student can not appear in the sedualed Camp, He/She have to complete Camp by his/her own effort and risk at the vacation time. He/She can admit in semester-3 but the result of semester-2 withheld until completion of Camp.

6.4 FARMERS FAMILY WORK SIBIR:

In third semester farmers family work sibir or eye camp of 10 days organize by college. All students compulsory join this camp.

In farmers family work sibir a pair of student live with farmer at farmer's home & Work with them. Also join in daily sedual of farmer, so that student realize the hardness in life of farmer.

In special circumstances college can arrange to join eye camp at bodhagaya instead of farmers family work sibir. Student work with very poor people, serve them and learn about management of camp and situation of Rural poor people of Bihar.

6.5 `EDUCATIONAL TOUR

In fourth Semester 10 to 15 days tour programme arrange by the college. All students have to compulsory join in this tour. Tour programme will be arranged in Gujarat & OR other state of country to study Agriculture University and research station, Gaushala & Tabelas, Historical places, Khadi & Gramodhyog institutes, Agriculture processing industries and religion places.

If student can not appear in the sedualed Tour, He/She have to complete Tour by his/her own effort and risk at the vacation time. He/She can admit in semester-5 but the result of semester-4 withheld until completion of Tour.

6.6 VILLAGE CAMP

In fifth semester village camp will be of 10 days arranged by the college. All students have to compulsory join this camp to know the village in all aspect. In this camp college arrange lectures of experts on different subject related to village and student development.

Students also work on survey, observation, study note, labour work, cultural programme, Rural people contact, management of primary school, women & youth development activity, percolation pit, Rural cleanliness etc. Report of the camp must be submitted by student to the college.

6.7 WORK EXPERIENCE & THESIS WRITING [CORE SUB. 15]

In 5th Semester students has to do practical partial research work on the field and library study work.

In practical research work student of Agronomy take field experiment on campus farm, take observation, Analyze the data and prepare thesis. Student of extension education collect socio-economic data analyze them and prepare thesis. Students of Animal Husbandry & Dairy Science take minor research on Animal OR Fodder crop take observation, Analyze the data and prepare thesis. OR Data collect from Animal holders & analyze the data and prepare thesis.

If student can not submit thesis and study report He/She failed in this subject.

6.8 PLACEMENT PROGRAMME (KENDRA NIVAS)[CORE SUB. 20]

There shall be a placement programme (Kendra Nivas) of 40 days duration for each student during sixth semester. Each student will be placed in an institution related to his/ her core subject. In this 40 days, 20 days for Gram Nivas, Farm Nivas, Gaushala Nivas for Extension, Agronomy and Animal husbandry Core Subject students respectively. While remaining 20 days N.G.O. Nivas, Agriculture University Nivas, Dairy OR Doctor Nivas for Extension, Agronomy and Animal husbandry Core Subject students respectively. A pair of student will be in placement programme at a time. Weekly report and final report will be submitted by students after completion of placement programme.

R.B.R.S. - 7. PROMOTION, RE-ADMISSION RULES & MAXIMUM TIME FOR COMPLETION OF COURSE

7.1 Rules of promotion shall be as under:

- 7.1.1 From semester I to semester II, if a student undergoes a regular course of study of the semester I and fulfills the required criterion of attendance and secures minimum 12 (out of 30) marks in the internal assessment component of each course.
- 7.1.2 From semester II to semester III, if a student undergoes a regular course of study of the semester II and fulfills the required criterion of attendance and secures minimum 12 (out of 30) marks in the internal assessment component of semester II.
- 7.1.3 From semester III to semester IV, if a student undergoes a regular course of study of the semester III and fulfills the required criterion of attendance and secures minimum 12 (out of 30) marks in the internal assessment component of semester III.
- 7.1.4 From semester IV to semester V, if a student undergoes a regular course of study of the semester V and fulfills the required criterion of attendance and secures minimum 12 (out of 30) marks in the internal assessment component of semester IV and clears all the courses of semester I and II.
- 7.1.5 From semester V to semester VI, if a student undergoes a regular course of study of the semester VI and fulfills the required criterion of attendance and secures minimum 12 (out of 30) marks in the internal assessment component of semester V.

7.2 Rules and the Procedure for granting Re-admission to the student shall be as under,

- 7.2.1 who had not put in the required attendance in a course in the concerned Programme of a semester and thus detained, or
- 7.2.2 who had not cleared the required number of Courses and thus detained ; or
- 7.2.3 who had not, after completing a semester continued the studies in the next immediate semester on personal / health grounds but desired to continue his/her studies after a short break; such a student shall be eligible to rejoin the Programme from where he/she had left it.
- 7.2.4 A student who had put in not less than 40% of attendance in a semester and not registered for the examination shall be considered for the re-admission in the same semester.
- 7.2.5 The student, who after completing the first two semesters Programme, if opts out of the Programme, then he or she shall be eligible to rejoin the Programme, subject to the time period elapsed has not exceeded two years.
- 7.2.6 Such readmissions shall be granted by the Principal of the concerned college directly, subject to the fulfillment of the following conditions:
- a) The concerned teachers have granted the attendance of the Course in each semester.
 - b) The student shall complete the Programme within double the duration of the Programme from the year of the original admission.
 - c) No readmission shall be granted after the first four weeks of the Semester in which he/she is seeking admission.
- 7.2.7 Readmission shall not be applicable to the Programme in which admission is granted by a Central Admission Committee / college itself.
- 7.2.8 The Six-semester (three year) Programme shall be completed by a student within double the duration of the normal Programme period (i.e. 6 years).

Note: The provisional grade card will be issued at the end of every semester indicating the course completed successfully. Upon successful completion of Bachelor degree Program a final grade card, which shall consist of grades of all courses will be issued by the Controller of Examinations of the University. Such a final grade card may be formed as shown in Table as under.

R.B.R.S. – 8 Awards of Grades, SGPA, CGPA

Credits, Grade Letter, Grade Points and Credit Points

8.1 Credit means the unit by which the course work is measured. In these Regulations: one credit means one hour of teaching work or one and half hours of practical work per week.

8.2 Grade Letter is an index to indicate the performance of a student in a particular course (Paper). It is the transformation of actual marks secured by a student in a course/paper. It is indicated by a Grade letter O, A, B, C, D, E, and F. There is a **range of marks** for each Grade Letter.

8.3 Grade Point is weight allotted to each grade letter depending on the marks awarded in a course/paper

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)

Credit Points for the course = No. of Credits assigned for the course x Grade Point secured for that course.

SGPA indicates the performance of a student in a given Semester. SGPA is based on the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses and the total number of credits assigned to the courses/papers in a Semester.

Note:

SGPA is computed only if the candidate passes in all the courses (gets a minimum

‘E’ Grade in all Courses)

The following examples illustrate the calculation of Grade Points, Credit Points and Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA). The percentage of marks shown in column III is the marks secured by the student in the Internal Evaluation and Semester End Examination put together.

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)

CGPA refers to the Cumulative Grade Point Average weighted across all the semesters (6Semesters). CGPA is obtained by dividing the total number of credit points (CPts) in all the semesters by the total number of credits in all the Semesters

R.B.R.S. – 9

9.1 Rules for selection of Core Subject:

- 9.1.1** A general merit list will be prepared on the basis of percentage of First and Second Semester Marks.
- 9.1.2** The Core subject will be allotted as per own choice of each student according to the merit list.
- 9.1.3** The equal number of students will be allotted in each Core subject.
- 9.1.4** In case if two or more students have equal merit in the merit list, then the percentage of std. 12 will be considered to offer the subject.

9.2 Rules for Selection of Elective Subjects:

- 9.2.1** The Elective subjects shall be offered to students looking to the availability of the teachers in a particular college or nearby colleges.
- 9.2.2** Out of the titles offered under a particular Elective Subject, the number of students should be distributed equally.
- 9.2.3** The distribution of students in titles offered under a particular Elective subject may be variable within the range of 10 percent.
